Dear Madam:

You are advised that it appears from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 42196, that Peter Fleck, or Fleck, was born July 15, 1788.

He enlisted at Spring House Tavern, eighteen miles above Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, on January 8 or 15, 1776, served as a private in Captain Thomas Craig's Company, Colonel Arthur St. Clair's and Anthony Wayne's Pennsylvania Regiments, was in the battle of Three Rivers and was discharged in March or April, 1777. He also served later in 1787 and was in the battle of Brandywine and a skirmish at Schuylkill, length of service and names of officers not stated.

Soldier stated that he received a wound in the Revolutionary War, nature of said wound or time when it was incurred not given.

He was allowed pension on his application executed May 13, 1818, while a resident of Huntingdon County, Pennsylvania.

In 1820, soldier referred to his wife, Christina, as sixty-four years of age. In 1827, he resided in Center County, Pennsylvania, having moved there about 1823 *from Huntingdon Co. Pa*

One Abraham Fleck made affidavit in Center County in 1827, relationship to soldier not shown.

The Revolutionary War records of this bureau fail to show a claim for pension on file on account of George Fleck.
